We were fortunate to have the team at Naked Creative design our new logo and tagline, and we're very excited to share it with all our community members, funders and partners. We feel our new logo is not only unique and eye-catching, but really captures who we are as an organization.

The work we did in 2014 reflected this commitment to building on what we do best. The NYCH team began developing new evaluation tools and systems in order to better understand the specific needs for our services, and to increase our impact in the communities we serve. NYCH also launched new initiatives such as the Perspectives Project to bring our work to more diverse communities, and expanded on the strengths of our participants and volunteers, as demonstrated by the growth of the Stepping Stones to Leadership program. A major project for the Board of Directors in 2014 was to develop our new three-year strategic plan. Both the planning process and the strategic plan itself, which will take us from 2015 through 2017, were unlike any we have undertaken before. n a sunny afternoon in August, an excited audience gathered in a small classroom at Joyce Public School for the presentation of the Michele Landsberg Community Award. The recipients? Our very own Village Bloggurls. The award was named after Michele Landsberg, awardwinning Canadian journalist, author, social activist and feminist. It was created by the Canadian Women's Foundation to celebrate community initiatives that empower girls and raise awareness about women's equality issues in Canada.

And the Village Bloggurls have been doing just that! Through their blog and social media activity, this diverse group of girls from the Lotherton neighbourhood have established a strong voice that not only expresses their unique perspectives, but also allows them to connect with each other and the community at large. From celebrating mentorship, to performing a neighbourhood safety

audit, to challenging Hollywood's portrayal of women and girls, the Village Bloggurls have shown us that theirs is a voice that needs to be heard.

The award presentation began with a short graduation ceremony for children in our Early Years Drop-in program. It was a fitting start as these preschoolers, who represent the future generation, were able to witness the strength of these tween-aged girls and the impact of generations shouldering upon one another. This sentiment was echoed in an inspiring speech by Michele Landsberg who stated, "...we know this opens the door for you to see yourselves as future leaders..." Finally, after the award was presented, the group of girls, who are determined to build the self-confidence of young girls everywhere, celebrated with – what else? – a proud group selfie.



n September of 2014, the NYCH community mourned the sudden loss of one of our former staff members, Nahom Berhane. This was a loss felt across the city, as Nahom was not only a strong member of the NYCH team, but had become a powerful and respected leader and role model in the Eritrean community.

During his time with NYCH, Nahom ran a number of programs for youth in the Trethewey community, and provided support to all its residents through a period of great change and transition. He was warm and funny, and always had a smile for everyone, even at the most challenging times. Nahom also had a real vision for working with the community, and a passion for creating opportunities for youth to

become great leaders. His commitment carried on in his subsequent work with other organizations.

or most teenagers, the summer is a glorious time - a chance to spend your days outside, hang out with friends, and think of anything but homework. However, newcomer youth often feel the pressure and isolation of settling in a new country, and struggle to establish a sense of identity. The summer months are the perfect time to address some of these issues while having fun at the same time.

Enter the Summer V.O.I.C.E. Mural Project. Standing for "Voicing Our Ideas for Change and Empowerment", V.O.I.C.E. programs allow newcomer youth to explore the arts, empowering them to express themselves and lead positive change. Through workshops and activities, they gain confidence, increase friendships, and improve their communication skills.

For three weeks in the summer of 2014, V.O.I.C.E. participants were given the opportunity to paint a mural on one of the outdoor walls of Northview Heights Secondary School in the Bathurst-Finch area. Before they started, they discussed the subject matter they wished to represent – focusing on the themes of peace, freedom, and diversity.

Day by day, the bare façade was transformed by streaks of vibrant colour, as this enthusiastic group of youth brought their artistic vision to life. When the summer came to an end, and all the paintbrushes were cleaned up and the ladders were put away, all that was left to do was to share the mural with the rest of the community.

The Mural Celebration on October 18, 2014 was a community event that brought together students, parents, and residents of the Bathurst-Finch neighbourhood. Led by our Youth Leadership Worker, Amy, with guidance from Northview Heights Secondary School, Action for Neighbourhood Change Bathurst-Finch, and Unison Health and Community Services, the youth participants put together an entertaining evening, culminating in the official unveiling of their artwork.

It was truly an awesome sight to see these youth standing by the transformed wall that evening, but an even greater transformation could be seen in each of the participants. Monsaina Leones, a V.O.I.C.E. participant spoke of this change:

he Digital Divide was an incredibly successful Digital Storytelling project that was funded through a Google Grant and implemented in the Rexdale community. The project's focus was to bring newcomer youth and newcomer seniors together to share their stories and experiences, while learning about various computer programs and technology.

First, the youth participated in a Digital Storytelling creation workshop, where they were able to make their personal and unique stories, and then were trained to share these stories in discussion groups.

During the sessions with the seniors, participants shared that they were often overlooked and not seen as having anything important to add or share within the community. They just wanted the opportunity to finally be able to tell their stories, and this program helped them do exactly that. With the help of the newcomer youth, the seniors created beautiful and inspirational Digital Stories that captured their life journeys. The youth were then given a leadership role in sharing the seniors' stories with others in the community.

The program had a strong impact on the participants, their families and surrounding community. Many of the participants, both youth and seniors, mentioned that this was the first time that they had been given the opportunity to highlight their experiences and felt proud that others would learn from their stories.

uilding on its success from the first year, the Stepping Stones to Leadership program continued in 2014 to help newcomer volunteers work towards their employment and life goals, and connect them with Canadian mentors for support. This structured and tailored approach to supporting newcomers as they enter the workplace continued to grow, as past participants returned to mentor those just beginning the program.

In September 2014, we held an event to celebrate the success of the participants in Stepping Stones to Leadership to date, as well as to raise the profile of the program and expand our network of contacts. This 'Idea Mixer' brought together program participants, graduates, and people from across the private, non-profit and public sectors.

Attendees enjoyed a wonderful evening of celebration and networking, hosted by the Shamba

Foundation in downtown Toronto. The activities of the evening were designed to encourage the sharing of ideas and feedback to further strengthen the Stepping Stones to Leadership program. There was a live tweet wall where guests posted their ideas, which led to robust discussions about the challenges newcomers face in establishing new careers in Canada.

Additionally, one of the new Digital Stories featuring a Stepping Stones participant was screened, highlighting the impact of the program on a very personal level. Not only was the event a success in itself, but it significantly increased the network of contacts for the program's newcomer participants.

Stepping Stones to Leadership is a wonderful demonstration of all the skills, strengths and leadership newcomers contribute to the Canadian workforce, and to the broader community.






THE CHALLENGE

hat issues are important to you? For the past year, we've been asking our participants to answer this question as a way to kick-start a political discussion — and the resulting conversations are what Democracy Talks is all about.

Democracy Talks is an initiative launched by Samara Canada, an organization that aims to reconnect citizens to politics, and is based on the idea that political participation begins simply by talking about the things that matter to you. According to Samara, these facilitated discussions have "inspired new ideas, strengthened social bonds, and motivated people to become more active and engaged in politics and society." NYCH is proud to be a partner in bringing this important dialogue to our communities.

When we began implementing Democracy Talks activities into our programs, we saw how effective they were in getting local residents interested in civic issues. While many newcomers avoid politics

as a result of being in an unfamiliar country, facing a language barrier, or being unable to vote, Democracy Talks has encouraged participants to take part in lively discussions, share their opinions and, most importantly, to be heard.

In 2014, NYCH facilitated 30 Democracy Talks sessions involving 300 participants. Through these conversations, these community members not only increased their overall level of political knowledge, but also increased their interest and attention to politics. It is our belief that civic involvement helps individuals to become more confident and connected, ultimately helping to create a vibrant, healthy democracy for us all.



he experience of immigrating to Canada creates many challenges for teens and young adults, from leaving what is familiar, to learning a new language and trying to fit in...and this is on top of the typical difficulties we all face in growing up.

For some newcomer youth, there is the added stress of identifying as lesbian, gay, bisexual, trans and/ or queer (LGBTQ), or questioning their sexuality, an experience which can be incredibly isolating. It is often difficult for newcomer youth to talk to anyone about issues around sexuality because they don't know many people in their new community, and because they may fear rejection, discrimination and even violence.

The Perspectives Project started in 2014, and in its first year, brought together newcomers who

identify as LGBTQ to discuss their issues and concerns, as well as to connect with each other and to the supports they need. To facilitate this program, young people from LGBTQ communities were hired as Peer Leaders. Their first task was to create their own short videos, or 'Digital Stories' about their personal experiences.

They were then trained to use their Digital Stories to begin conversations with newcomer LGBTQ youth and others in the community about issues such as healthy relationships, dealing with stress, oppression, and isolation. Through the discussions and connections created during these story circles, participants developed an increased sense of belonging, acceptance, and identity. Many have developed strong bonds with each other and with allies, which makes them feel like they're not alone. LGBTQ newcomer youth have also gained the confidence and support they need to thrive.





he team at NYCH was incredibly proud this year to participate once again in the Scotiabank Toronto Waterfront Marathon, especially since this was the first time we had runners and walkers of our own. We also had a

great group of cheerleaders who lent their voices and spirit to keeping all the participants motivated, which was important on a chilly October morning.

Our eager and excited group of 32 NYCH staff, volunteers, friends and family members ran and walked the 5k and half-marathon routes. While crossing the finish line was a great achievement in itself, we were also able to raise over \$10,000 in the process! We look forward to beating our own record in 2015.
